CURRENT INITIATIVES

The members of the Board of Directors had three teleconferences and two face-to-face Board meetings this year. Between meetings and teleconferences – the Board does a significant amount of work via email to address the everyday workings of the Association.

Membership

Our membership as of March 31, 2004 was 1023, down from 1091 in the year prior. We continue to explore opportunities to share the vision and goals of CACCN with as many critical care nurses as possible.

Communication Boards

Of the original 100 communication boards that were purchased by the CACCN for distribution to critical care units across the country, only a few remain. A special thank-you to our liaisons for maintaining the Boards with up to date information including announcements, notifications of contests such as for Nursing Week and deadlines for applications for CACCN awards/educational bursaries, and membership applications.

The CACCN communication boards are intended to promote communication and networking, and to build our membership. Indeed, they have served us well.

One of the advantages of the permanently mounted, CACCN logo shaped boards that they allow us to reach the critical care nursing community at large and, in that way, promote optimal care for all patients and families.

Research



The CACCN – Research Committee works to facilitate the conduct and utilization of critical care nursing research.

- The Research Committee consists of Wendy Fallis (Manitoba), Martha Mackay (BC), Sabrina Martin (Ontario) and is chaired by Patricia Hynes, CACCN Vice-President.
- A mission statement for the committee is being developed under the leadership of Dr. Wendy Fallis.
- Thank-you to all the nurses who shared their vision of critical care nursing research on a survey distributed at the Dynamics conference. Results will be shared with the membership in the near future.
- The CACCN Research grant (\$1000.00) was awarded to Paula Price from Calgary, Alberta.

CNA Certification



CACCN continues to support and promote the Canadian Nurses' Association's specialty exam for Critical Care. In 2003, 27 CACCN members were newly certified, 34 CACCN members re-certified and 14 CACCN members wrote the Pediatric exam.

- Sue Williams is responsible for the adult portfolio while Brenda Morgan continues as the BOD liaison working in partnership with the CNA as a member of the Adult Critical Care Exam Committee.
- SARS interfered with the writing of the exam in 2003 and as a result there were two sittings of the exam. CACCN is experiencing some difficulty in getting final numbers of certified members.
- Financial awards (3 newly certified and 3 re-certified) will be given out once CACCN National Office is assured that all the names of those eligible for 2003 are in.
- A letter of congratulations will be issued on behalf of the CACCN to each newly certified critical care nurse as well as to each nurse who has re-certified.
- 2003 was the first year for the writing of the pediatric critical care certification exam.
- Grace MacConnell is responsible for this portfolio with Judy Rashotte as the liaison to the CACCN Board of Directors.

Publications



Dynamics – The Official Journal of the CACCN is the only peer-reviewed critical care nursing journal in Canada. We publish four issues annually, which are distributed to approximately 1300 subscribers. The journal is also listed in three indexes.

- The summer issue of Dynamics is reserved for publishing abstracts that have been accepted for presentation at our fall conference, also called Dynamics. We have received a lot of positive feedback from conference delegates and the membership at large who report that this initiative is helpful in keeping them in touch with current and new practices in critical care.
- Paula Price, our Clinical Editor, continues to do an outstanding job in effectively leading the Editorial Review Board team, consisting of Debbie Fraser Askin (Manitoba), Janice Beitel (Ontario), Franco Carnevale (Quebec), Bonnie Davies (Manitoba), Kathleen Graham (Ontario), Joy Kramrich (Ontario), Martha Mackay (BC) and Judy Rashotte (Ontario). The Publications Chair for 2003-2004 is Patricia Hynes – CACCN Vice-President.
- CACCN is fortunate to have the commitment of Pappin Communications of Penbrooke, Ontario. Bruce, CB and Heather have provided tremendous ongoing support.
- The Dynamics Journal is hosting a new column offered by the Institute for Safe Medication Practices Canada (ISMP Canada). We hope to provide patient safety information on an ongoing basis and have encouraged these individuals to provide regular submissions.

Thank-you to all our readers and especially the authors who contributed to making our journal a success over the past year.

Partnerships

Canadian Nurses Association

- ◆ The CNA chose to provide networking opportunities to the Associate and Affiliate groups via teleconferencing. Three teleconferences were held in which CACCN participated. It continues to be a great avenue to share information and learn more about CNA's initiatives.
- ◆ As an Associate group of the CNA, we also provide an annual report on CACCN's events and goals for the year to their Association.
- ◆ The suggestion of a commemorative stamp was forwarded through to the CNA as a result of discussion at our last AGM in PEI. The CNA will be looking into this option in 2008 along with its centennial celebrations.
- ◆ The CNA is also looking into fee structures and dates for the certification exams which may be more conducive to nurses and encourage writing.
- Educational initiatives were increased to raise awareness, e.g., a poster was distributed.
- Provincial and federal groups also collaborated with families regarding recognition needs
- Lori Garchinski and Grace MacConnell traveled to Vancouver last April to participate in a forum entitled "Neurological Determination of Brain Death." The goal of this forum was to develop a national consensus around neurological determination of death. CACCN was pleased to have been invited to sit at this table. There was truly a multidisciplinary team approach involving many key players such as Emergency Nurses, Critical Care Society, Neurology and Neurosurgery groups, Legal and ethical groups, Emergency Physicians and representation from pediatric and adult settings.

Canadian Critical Care Society

- CACCN members continue to be involved with education sessions offered by CCCS and wish to continue and enhance such involvement.

World Federations

- ◆ Bernice Budz became the CACCN representative for the World Federation of Critical Care Nursing this year; Bernice is also Treasurer of the Board for this group.

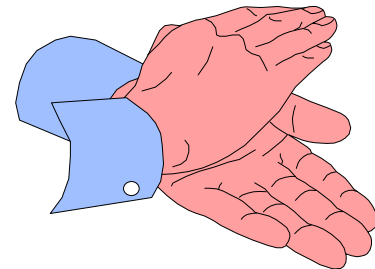
CHAPTER CONNECTIONS DAY
